Synagogue honors longstanding members

In early February, Yale and Ida Schulman moved to Austin, Texas, to be closer to their daughter Rebecca.

The couple was honored by friends and family on Jan.23, at a special Shabbat service at Agudath Achim.

Yale qvelled about their grandson, Jacob Nemirov, who chanted the maftir, and about their daughters, Becky and Naomi, who had Torah honors. Ida was touched by the outpouring of good wishes from the gathering that packed the AAC chapel.

Congregation president Elliott Bilofsky awarded the title of Honorary Life President to Yale in recognition of his decades of devoted service to the congregation. Clark Adelman thanked Yale



for his work in establishing the endowment funds at AAC, insuring the financial viability of the synagogue for many years to come.

Both Ida and Yale's contributions to the greater

community were recounted by representatives of Improved Dwellings for Altoona, AMBUCS and Call for Action.

The Schulmans are lifelong residents of Altoona. Yale, along with his brothers, served in the armed forces during WWII, and Yale was part of the Normandy invasion. After returning home, he and Ida Karp were married in April of 1947-- almost 63 years ago. They celebrated their 60th anniversary at the Synagogue in 2007.

Film Festival celebrates 11th year

O Jerusalem - 100 minutes, English (made in USA and Israel) 2006. An epic drama re-creating the historic struggle surrounding the creation of the State of Israel in 1948. At the center are two young American friends - one Jewish, one Arab. The film is told from alternating viewpoints of the Jews, Arabs and Brits, all of whom collide in their fight for control of Jerusalem. It brings to the fore-front themes of courage, terrorism, deprivation, politics and a strong sense of morality. The film goes from the streets of New York to the Holy Land, where the friends risk their lives for what they believe in, as the city of their dreams teeters on the brink of destruction.

No. 4 Street of Our Lady – 95 minutes, English, documentary (made in USA and Poland) 2009. The documentary tells the remarkable, yet little known story of a Polish-Catholic woman who rescued 15 of her Jewish neighbors during the Holocaust. It culminates three years of production work that has taken the filmmakers - all faculty members at Penn State University's College of Communications - to Israel, Ukraine and numerous locations around the United States, where they have gathered material, conducted interviews and captured dramatic moments on camera. The film draws on excerpts from a diary kept by one of the survivors, Moshe Maltz, whose granddaughter, Judy is one of the filmmakers and along with her colleague, Richie Sherman will join us to introduce and discuss their film.

Making Trouble - *A project of the Jewish Women's Archive*, 85 minutes, English, documentary, (made in USA) 2006. A rollicking journey with three generations of funny Jewish women. Defying cultural expectations and changing the rules. Molly Picon, Fanny Brice, Sophie Tucker, Wendy Wasserstein and Gilda Radner successfully went from vaudeville and the Yiddish theater to Broadway, from Ziegfeld's Follies to Saturday Night Live. From a table in Katz's Deli in New York City, leading Jewish comedians, Judy Gold, Jackie Hoffman, Cory Kahaney and Jessica Kirson guide you on this comedic journey. Oscar nominated director Oren Jacoby turns the camera on author and former Catholic priest James Carroll as he embarks on a journey to confront his past and uncover the dark side of Christianity. Carroll explores a legacy of religious violence, from the rise of genocidal anti-Semitism to modern day wars sparked by religious extremism. Constantine's Sword forces us to confront the question: Why do we kill people in the name of God? Father Mark Begly, Pastor of St. John the Evangelist Catholic Church, Lakemont, will introduce and discuss the film.

Madelyn's most significant role models are her parents. She says, "My dad knows how to have fun; he is most remembered for playing like a kid, with his kids. He always would pile my friends in his convertible, taking us to movies, McDonalds or sled riding. He is always singing; appropriately his name is Mike Singer. My mom is also great; she is my favorite person to talk to. She is a fabulous cook and costume designer. She always taught me how to fix everything. Even though she won't touch a computer, she gave me the skills. My

mom taught me the value of volunteering. She has been president of Fort Worth Jewish Women's International (formerly B'nai Brith Women) for over 10 years. She also does catering for her synagogue. She has never had a paid job, but she works as hard as those who do.

Early Jewish memories: We grew up orthodox in Cleveland. All of our holidays centered around great food and a lot of fun. All of my relatives lived within a few blocks, and there would be at least 40 family members at all of our dinner. I have around 20 first cousins, and we always enjoyed the time we spent together as kids.

In our Jewish community, we are most proud of: All of our wonderful "family" friends. There are no clicks, everyone is just friends with everyone. Everyone has talents and everyone works hard in whatever they do.

Ed Hand, 82, died on Oct. 13, 2009 in Altoona. He was a native of Brooklyn,

Ed and Harriett joined Temple Beth Israel and were active members there as well as with many community groups. Ed will be remembered for his ready smile, good sense of humor, devotion to his family and his generosity.

Hy Adelman, 88, died on Nov. 19, 2009 in Altoona. He was one of seven children born to the late Rose and Sam Adelman. Hy was a lifelong member of Agudath Achim Congregation, a



charter member of AZA, and a 1939 graduate of Altoona High School. He joined the Army during WWII and served in the Air Corps as a Corporal in

Hy worked for the Pennsylvania Railroad as a shipper/receiver. Hy enjoyed sports and was active at the JMC especially in the bowling league. He was a loyal minyonaire at the Synagogue praying with his distinctive and booming voice.

In 1942, Hy married Jennie Swonger who died in 1988, They had three children, Joy, Ron and Clark, seven grandchildren and six great grandchildren.

Marty Weinstein, 91, died on Nov. 14, 2009 at his home in Duncansville, where he resided with his loving family. He grew up in Altoona and lived for many years at the corner of 14th Avenue and 18th Street. Over the years, many people would stop and visit him there or wave and say hello as they passed his home. He loved sports, especially basketball, and had many stories to tell



about the teams for which he played as well as his memories of watching others play over the past 75 or so vears.

Morris was a proud member of the greatest generation.

On Veteran's Day, Nov. 11, 2004, Morris spoke at Tyrone's American Legion/VFW ceremony. He shared his story because he and Tom Brokaw encouraged WWII vets to tell their stories. Morris spoke of serving from 1942 until 1945 in various stations in the United States, before going to Europe and being part of the D-Day invasion. After being wounded, he was assigned to the USO. where he met Bing Crosby, Fred Astaire and members of the Glenn

Miller band. He concluded his remarks by stating, "I hope and pray that the present and next generations will not have to endure what our generations did."

Morris was born in Altoona on "Jew Hill." His parents came to Altoona from



Lithuania and married in Altoona. Morris is one of four brothers. Morris and his wife, Bess, married in 1945. She passed away in 2001 after 55 years of marriage. They have two daughters: Ida

Morris was a minyonaire at Agudath Achim, chaired the High Holiday Honors committee and ushered for many years. He was a 50-plus year member of Kiwanis and was active in almost every Tyrone civic and business group. Morris was a member of the Tyrone Players and acted in many plays.

Morris opened his shoe store in Tyrone in 1945 with 395 pairs of ladies slippers, and he retired in 1988.

When asked the best advice ever received, Morris replied that his father told him, "Don't forget your synagogue; don't argue religion or politics."
