


I've been a contributor to the Federation campaign since: I moved to Altoona in 1961.

I have been to Israel: Once. We went with a whole group of Altoona people in the mid-'70s. There were 16 of us from this area, and it was all of our first trip to Israel. There were the Leopolds, Scheinbergs, Katzens, Susan and Dave Burrows. We all wore sweaters that said: "Altoona Has Hustle." Altoona got known very quickly.

My first memories of being Jewish include: I still remember my Sunday School days. My parents were always Federation givers. I came from a predominantly-Jewish area in South Orange, N.J. We were reform and we went to Hebrew and Sunday School on Sunday mornings. We always celebrated all the Jewish holidays with family and friends.

My strongest Jewish influence at an early age were: My mother had two friends that were very involved in Jewish organizations. One kept kosher and my grandmother kept strictly kosher so I knew about Judaism because of them. And I often went to the kosher butcher with my mother. And we would go into New York on 47th Street and you'd see the Hasidic Jews walking up and down the street with their long beards.

The leaders in the Altoona Jewish community when I first came here were: Sam Port, Rose Port and all the

Ports, Irv Bregman, Julius Rosch. As time went on, Evelyn and Howard Kenvin, Peter Billig, Bert Leopold, Bess Levine and my husband, Donald. Those are some of them. **Past positions held:** I've been on the Federation board and helped to run both the men's and women's campaigns. I've been very active at the Synagogue, running the gift shop for the last 39 years, and have been involved in many aspects of the Synagogue, including being a past Hadassah president. I've also served on a number of boards, and have tried to do a lot of fund-raising in the community.

In our Jewish community, I am most proud: Donny and I have been strongly involved in the Jewish and non-Jewish activities in our community. We have both been very philanthropic, and we taught our children that they should be leaders in the community. I feel very lucky I am financially able to support and help others. Judaism has always played a very important part of our life. At the same time, we've always been very closely associated with many non-Jewish people, which was different in the way than I was brought up. We were brought up in a predominantly-Jewish environment.

My vision for our Jewish community includes: Because we're a small Jewish community, I would love to see the Synagogue and Temple merged. I feel we should all be one. I think it would be a much healthier atmosphere. Truthfully, let's face it: We're all one anyway.



L' Chaim Perspective: Heidi Housman **'I embraced the State of Israel'**

From April 21-23, I embraced the state of Israel with my heart and mind.

For so long I had shut my doors to the thought of terrorism in Israel and America's role in the whole mess. I was too self-absorbed to realize that the people of the Jewish homeland, my people, were struggling to keep Israel alive.

Three intense days in April changed my life and my mindset.

Along with fellow Hillel members from WVU, I attended the 43rd annual AIPAC convention. We were joined by some 600 other college students and nearly 3,000 adult AIPAC members. Famous diplomats, foreign politicians, past and present prime ministers of Eretz Yisrael – all united by a common bond – a love for Israel.

The three days spent in Washington D.C. were filled with wonderful new friends, inspirational speakers and, of course, incredible security.

Upon being police escorted, I noticed the snipers on the roof. Tough security guards hovered around and bombsniffing dogs roamed about. Metal detectors and full body pat downs became the norm and identification badges hung about our necks each day. All of this heightened security scared me. However, it was also comforting to know that we were being watched after.

The foreign Minister of Israel, Shimon Peres, addressed us. His voice captivated me. He was so gentle and well-spoken, and it was truly an honor to be in his presence. He could not thank our country enough for its support.

He said, "We have had one great help – the friendship and support of the United States."

Senate Majority Leader Tom Daschle showed his support of Israel in an unforgettable speech. Here was a man who is not Jewish, but somehow he still shared this love. As he spoke the last words of his speech, the 3,000 strong audience rose to their feet, cheering unanimously for several breathtaking moments. "Am Yisrael Chai!" he said – Israel will live!

Our dinner will be one I will never forget. Benjamin Netanyahu addressed AIPAC. As he approached the microphone everyone stared chanting, "Bibi! Bibi! Bibi!" The excitement and anticipation of his speech was overwhelming. His words were so inspirational. One comment refer-

ring to the Middle East that I particularly remember was, "It is not that they hate the West because of Israel. They hate Israel because of the West."

As I looked around, excited faces flashed and glowed. The sound of 600 pro-Israeli Jewish students singing the familiar Hebrew songs radiated throughout the massive crowd. I sang along and clapped my hands. All of these college kids were so pro-Israeli. Their hearts were filled with this incredible passion and I was so excited to feel this passion in my own heart.

For the first time, I felt this undeniable connection to my people and the land of Eretz Yisrael. It was the most incredibly overwhelming feeling!

Although Netanyahu did not speak very long, his words were inspirational. At the conclusion of his speech, I reached out my hand and for a brief moment he embraced it, shaking my hand in his. It was a wonderful touch to end a fantastic day.

The next day we went to the Jefferson Memorial. Senator John McCain took the podium. As they announced his name, they told of his heroic struggle in Vietnam and they also told about his love for Israel and his devotion to the state. Senator McCain's speech was filled with hope for Israel's future. At the conclusion of his powerful speech, my friend Dana and I made our way though the monstrous crowd and shook the hand of this brave man. He shook

Tessie Sky-Sabbag returned home to Altoona, along with her husband Sami and son Jonathon, and she spoke to a gathering from the Jewish community on August 2.

The Sabbag family live in Rishon-Lezion, the third largest city in Israel where Tessie is an elementary school teacher. Tessie said suicide bombings have become so common throughout Israel that security measures have to be taken to an extreme.

"The suicide bombings bring war to your own neighborhood. The threat of terrorism never escapes the minds of Israeli citizens. It affects your everyday life-you avoid crowded places. You don't go out alone. You stay home. You have to feel comfortable in your own home."

Tessie and her family will return to Rishon-Lezion despite the terrorism. Even though there is danger, there are many rewards.

"I've found many comforts living there," she said. The comfort of living with people of my own religion, the comfort of being with my in-laws, the comfort of speaking Hebrew and English and making connections with both languages, and the comfort of being part of Israel and the Israeli heritage. It's not the easiest place to live, but for me it's the right place to live."

The Sabbags spoke at a breakfast at the Hampton Inn cosponsored by Israel Bonds and the Greater Altoona Jewish Federation. Special thanks to Phil and Roz Sky for their planning of the event, and also to Greg Morris for his hospitality.
